I. Background of the Constitutional Convention

- Date and Location: May to September 1787, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.
- Purpose: To address the weaknesses of the Articles of Confederation.

II. Major Issues Discussed

- Representation in Congress: How states would be represented.
- Slavery: How to address the issue of slavery in representation and taxation.
- Federal vs. State Power: Balance of power between national and state governments.

III. The Great Compromise (Connecticut Compromise)

- Proposed by: Roger Sherman.
- Structure: Bicameral legislature.
 - House of Representatives: Based on population (larger states favored).
 - Senate: Equal representation (two senators per state; smaller states favored).

IV. Ratification Debates

- Federalists:
 - Supporters of the Constitution.
 - Key Arguments:
 - Strong national government needed for order and stability.
 - Checks and balances would prevent tyranny.
 - Promised a Bill of Rights to address concerns.

Anti-Federalists:

- Opponents of the Constitution.
- Key Arguments:
 - Fear of a strong central government infringing on individual liberties.
 - Lack of a Bill of Rights to protect citizens' rights.
